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ABOUT NACDI

The North American Cultural Diplomacy Initiative (NACDI) is a multi-disciplinary research network of academics, policymakers, and practitioners in the field of cultural diplomacy (CD) from North America and beyond.

Our objective is to advance new scholarship and research that provides a greater understanding of how CD functions to connect North America globally; not merely as part of the "soft power" tool-kit of nation states, but as a multi-directional and potentially activist practice that encompasses a broad range of non-state actors, including cultural institutions, managers, producers, consumers, and communities seeking to imagine counter-hegemonic possibilities and inclusive futures. By establishing a strategic network of networks, we aim to establish CD as a critical practice and raise cultural diplomacy's profile as a valuable tool to foster global and intercultural relations – that is, to mobilize it to inform public policy development and implementation. Our interest lies in vitalizing the fullest range of core values and benefits of culture – not only culture as aesthetic pleasure and in its economic impact – to include social cohesion and resilience, education and self-development, democratic citizenship, collective expression, and identity building for what a "new cultural diplomacy" at the intersection of the local/global could be.

We are developing a vibrant research community that advances CD as a critical practice, generates new research, trains (graduate) students and practitioners to create effective initiatives and linkages, and engages in outreach through activities accessible to diverse constituencies and broader publics. Bringing the diverse and complementary resources of cultural practitioners and students of culture together with those of diplomats, policy-makers, and scholars on the other side of the culture/diplomacy divide and by establishing linkages with adjacent organizations, NACDI leverages the knowledge and expertise of its partners, raises the profile of its research and scholarship, and creates a unique and dynamic forum through which to advance CD.

As the initial focus of NACDI's activities, "North America" serves as a vital geopolitical imaginary. In this capacity, it intersects with and links to other geopolitical regions and imaginaries (including but not limited to the global Indigenous community, Latin America, Asia-Pacific, the Anglosphere, and the French-speaking world), and thus provides a means to engage with their CD Networks and organization.

SUMMIT DESCRIPTION

Policies as Discourses is the last in a series of three research summits organized by the North American Cultural Diplomacy Initiative as part of the SSHRC-funded research project *The Cultural Relations Approach to Diplomacy: Practice, Players, Policy.*

Policies as Discourses proposes a way of ordering the strategies of performing cultural diplomacy through the lenses of "policies", seen as discourses that produce (uneven) effects and outcomes in the practices and in the players. Also, this summit is an opportunity to revisit the conversations initiated in the first two summits regarding "practice" and "players" of cultural diplomacy.

In keeping with the particular angle of critical cultural diplomacy, we focus on understanding how the policies of cultural diplomacies act discursively to both interact with and challenge the primacy of state-based policymaking. This undertaking can be achieved by foregrounding the contributions of non-state actors, different agendas and approaches, as well as a range of policymakers. This approach rests on the commitment to broaden the concepts, agendas and actors understood as contributing to cultural diplomacy and suggests its role is best understood through discourses and discursive practices, i.e. policies and polities. In other words, we are aiming at de-centering state-based cultural diplomacy, which is one part of a larger complex field of diplomatic activity. As such, this summit opens critical space for multiple converging and dissenting voices to engage with different representations and discourses on cultural diplomacy.

On this, we are interested in discussing new meanings to concepts such as soft power, city brand, public diplomacy, cultural cooperation, educational exchanges, cultural broadcast, art exhibitions, public relations and propaganda, among many others. For this closing summit, we aim at developing a fresh discussion on how policy discourses condition (and/or liberate) the resources and capacities of cultural diplomacy to advance power agendas and fulfill its own (self-imposed teleological) discourses.

Keynote: A humanity-centered approach to cultural diplomacy

Rhonda S. Zaharna invites us to think critically about the idea of culture being an essential aspect of the nation-state and its cultural diplomacy. While culture has served to shape our notions of nationhood and cultural heritage, in the multicultural and interconnected world of the 21st century, the mediatization of culture provides new perspectives to understand culture as a diplomatic tool.

Humanity-centered diplomacies question the state-centric idea of cultural diplomacy, and the national symbols and myths that come with it, and offer a holistic approach where cultural diversity is seen as a catalyst and vehicle for human and diplomatic relations. In this keynote, Zaharna explores the possibilities for human-centered diplomacies in the making of public policy and what role non-state actors can play in the process.

Opening of *Die Verschwindende Wand* [Disappearing Wall]. Art Installation in collaboration with the Goethe Institute

"Disappearing Wall" (Verschwindende Wand) is an idea of Maria Yablonina, from a workshop organized by the Goethe Institut under the direction of the architect Werner Sobek. The project aims to make linguistic diversity more visible in the public space and also beyond European borders. The artistic installation "Disappearing Wall" consists of 6,000 blocks engraved with different phrases in the original language, including indigenous languages, and their translations into German and Spanish for visitors, who have the opportunity to take them away. The disappearance also symbolizes that we can overcome physical walls and especially those we build in our mind.

The wall has already been exhibited in 17 places in Europe. Gdansk, Madrid, Nicosia and Belfast are some of the cities where the Goethe-Institut has already made this interactive installation. Now it celebrates its premiere in Mexico City, in collaboration with the Universidad Iberoamericana. The Goethe-Institut Mexiko is the first non-European headquarters and represents a link between the linguistic areas of Europe and Latin America.

Representation policies are a key element in the contemporary world, where material, symbolic and discursive disputes around identities and collective projects are commonplace in different spaces on the international scene. Roundtable- Film as cultural diplomacy: Contesting field of imagination

Film is an essential aspect of cultural diplomacy. Through audiovisual screenings, people from around the world are able to experience different eras, cultures, and worldviews. It is also a place to (re)imagine reality, find new alternatives, and even use fiction to contest it. The development of networks of cooperation across borders through cinema can provide new forms of people to people engagement, with or without government support. However, when these forms of art are included in the cultural policy of a country in an effort to pursue national interests, the discourse takes a different turn.

In this panel, our speakers reflect on the possibilities and challenges of cinema as cultural diplomacy, the implications of including it as part of national public policy, and its role as diplomatic tools. The goal is to see this field as a space that can support diplomatic activity while serving as a space for resistance and contestation where different futures can be imagined. Music has been an acclaimed aspect of cultural diplomacy, both as a state and a non-state sponsored activity. Anastasia Sonaranda is an example of the multiple routes an artist can take as a musical ambassador. Her work as a guitarist, composer, and singer has awarded her two grants from the National Fund for Culture and the Arts. She has collaborated with the National Institute of Anthropology and History as the Chief Coordinator of the Mexican Guitar project.
